<u>C. Helpful Tips</u>

- 14. Pluses and minuses on getting lots of money for college and paying your own way.
- 15. Be mindful of financial aid packages where the college wants you to borrow a significant amount of money versus the college providing financial aid through scholarships and grants.
- 16. Finding colleges that are generous.
- 17. When you are offered your financial aid package, and you do not like it, you can submit a financial aid appeal letter to the college to ask them to review it. Example #1: After we submitted the financial aid appeal letter to the 3 prospective schools, School 1 said, "No more money to give you." School 2 said, "Here's \$2000." School 3 gave her the best resolution to the financial aid package, and that is the school she attended.

Example # 2: School 1 wants you to borrow what School 2 will give you in grants and scholarships.

Example #3: School 1 has a large amount of loans in their financial aid package. School 2 has a large amount of grants and scholarships in their package.
