Susan & Howard Richman, editors-412-783-6512 R.D.2, Box 117, Kittanning PA, 16201 THE FOLLOWING IS THE COMPLETE TEXT OF THE NEW REGULATIONS PASSED BY THE PA STATE SCHOOL BOARD THAT APPLY TO HOME EDUCATED STUDENTS. Note that this is NOT statute (a state law passed by the legislature), but a regulation passed by a state mandated Board. All sections in [brackets] are being DELETED from the regulation, and everything underlined is being added. Do notice that we are now somewhat free of the school calendar, as long as we can document 900 or 990 hours of instruction throughout the school year. Also interesting to note that the lawyer for the Dept. of ED viewed the new language as being a HELP to parents, a protection against arbitrary decisions from superintendents. We'll soon see.

EXCUSALS FROM PUBLIC SCHOOL ATTENDANCE SECTION 11.31. Pupils not enrolled in public schools due to private [instruction] tutoring. Private tutoring by a properly qualified tutor shall be subject to the <u>annual</u> approval of the district superintendent of schools. Such instruction shall include [the subjects and activities designated and prescribed by statute and shall be conducted daily throughout the period that the public schools of the district are in session. } for elementary school level students: English, including spelling, reading and writing, arithmetic, geography, the history of the United States and Pennsylvania, science, civics, including loyalty to the State and National Government, safety education, and the humane treatment of birds and animals, health, including physical education and and physiology, music and art. For secondary school level students, such instruction shall include: art, English, health, mathematics, music, physical education, science and social studies (including U.S. and PA history). Such instruction shall be given during the school year for a minimum of 180 days of instruction or for a minimum of 900 hours of instruction for an elementary level student and a minimum of 990 hours of instruction for a secondary level student as the equivalent of 180 days of instruction. The superintendent's approval of the tutor shall be by acceptable evidence of the tutor's ability to teach such program to the pupil and by written assurance from the parent that the instructional requirements listed above shall be met. approval is granted, the superintendent may afterwards also require such evidence as is deemed necessary to demonstrate that the pupil is making satisfactory progress in the tutoring program and that the required subjects are being taught for the
