On September 11 many Americans sat in front of their television sets watching stunned as terrorists crashed passenger jets into the World Trade Center.

At least one Pennsylvania Homeschoolers Accreditation Agency (PHAA) graduate, Dorien Casses (class of 1998) was there to see it in person. The daughter of Valerie and John Casses of

Johnstown, she was working five blocks away from the World Trade Center in lower Manhattan. She watched in horror with her own eyes as the twin towers collapsed.


Her office was closed for the next two weeks, but instead of staying home and watching television, she worked each day to see how she could help. Although she was not able to return to Manhattan because all the subways were closed, she was able to work on Staten Island rescuing some of the suddenly-homeless pets whose owners had perished in the World Trade Center.

All over the country there was an outpouring of help as people, including many homeschoolers, donated their time, their blood, and their money to help with the relief effort.

Meanwhile in Lancaster, another PHAA graduate, Seth Eckman (class of 1998) son of Francis and David Eckman of Stoystown, watched television as the drama unfolded. He had grown up in Somerset County just 3 miles from where determined passengers brought down the terrorist-con-

trolled plane near Somerset, but his attention was riveted upon the courageous firemen who went into the burning World Trade Center never to come back out. It brought back memories to him.

Until recently he had worked as an EMT in Somerset County. Once he got a call that there was smoke in a residence for the handicapped and elderly — it turned out just to

Without thinking of the danger to themselves, Seth and another EMT went into the smoke-filled building and started bringing people out. Almost every day, somewhere in this country courageous

fire fighters or EMT's go into dangerous buildings.

There are many homeschool graduates across our state who are now working as EMT's or Fire Fighters. For example Andrew Koch (PHAA, class of 1998), son of Laurie and Alan Koch of Natrona Heights, is serving as a volunteer fire fighter in his community. As a 21 year old fire fighter he

has helped out in various emergencies.

After the Attack on America, our nation turned with thankfulness and pride to the Americans serving in our military. In college he competed in the Ranger Challenge competition in which cadets compete with other colleges in physical training, marksmanship, weapons assemply, rope bridge construction, and a ten-kilometer road march.
