Each family always has some unique interest— from the amazing plasticene clay houses the Sherosky kids have made (andare constantly re-making!), to the animal and reptile cages on display everywhere in the Bigelow home, to watching Emily(11) and Clare(5) Murphy improvise a wonderful ballet to Mozart's "Eine Kleine Nacht Musik", and hegring Christian(8) improvise in 5/4 time on the piano (he loves Dave Brubeck's jazz), to seeing the modular castle Luke Wilson and his Dad, John, have designed and made from recycled homeosote., to the intricate ships-in-bottles made by Ray Wilson, to the fence Nathan Wilcox(7½) made all by himself around his tree swing. We often come away from visits with borrowed treasures—an Erie Canal song book right when we're in the midst of a canal binge, another Little Bear book for Jesse to read, a four-record set of "Lives of the great Composers". We've also shared book orders with other families— Beth Spatz has access to a great school library remainder catalog, which brought us a fine children's book on how dams are built (ready to answer our questions after visiting Kinzua Dam during a visit with Warren, PA homeschoolers...). Almost always get ideas for new books to read too—— Diana Baseman and Olivia (6) insisted we read Peter Pan and then Heidi, two major delights of our spring and summer.

So.... all this is just to urge you to look up families near you (or not near you but perhaps near some PA site you've been meaning to visit) and go spend a day with another homeschooling family. I guarantee you'll have a great time:
